PTHV is a high-impact family engagement strategy to build trusting home-to-school bonds through casual and voluntary inhome visits.

Teachers participating in PTHV will randomly select families to schedule a visit with.

Not every student in the teacher's class will receive an invitation for a visit.

Families may decline the invitation for the visit if they do not wish to participate. Teachers will contact the families directly to schedule a visit to accommodate both parties. Participating teachers have completed professional training on how to hold these visits to maximize their impact and effectiveness.

Teachers will visit homes in pairs and hold a casual visit to discuss their child and their goals, hopes, and dreams for their child's school year. Following the initial visit, teachers will reflect on their experience and incorporate that feedback into the child's classroom experience. Please contact your building principal with questions!




GHS STUDENT ART ON DISPLAY IN MADISON


ATHLETICS HIGHLIGHTS

The GHS track and field teams had a historic season, winning both the boys and girls Conference Championships for the first time in school history. The girls team broke school records in the 4x100m, 4x200m, and 4x400m relays, showcasing their talent and teamwork. The boys team also excelled, claiming both the Regional and Sectional Championship titles, marking only the fourth time in Grantsburg history.

Eleven athletes represented GSD at the State Tournament Meet. The girls 4x200m relay team—Noelle Doornink, Selah Prusinski, Anika Lee, and Jordan Java—finishing earning the team's first State Champion title. This incredible achievement reflects their hard work and dedication.



The 2024 Pirate baseball team had an impressive season, finishing with an 11-1 conference record and securing the conference championship. Vinny Vogland led the team with a .415 batting average, playing a crucial role in their success. 

Since 2017, iForward has participated in the Student Spaceflight Experiments Program (SSEP), collaborating with NCESSE and the Arthur C. Clarke Institute for Space Education. NanoRacks, LLC, under a Space Act Agreement with NASA, facilitates SSEP using the ISS as a National Laboratory.
